The 9th White Cliffs Festival of Winter Ales



This year will be the 9th Festival of Winter Ales held, as usual, at the Maison Dieu, Dover's Town Hall. The Maison Dieu is believed to be the oldest regular site of a beer festival in the UK and our thanks go to Dover District and Dover Town councils for their assistance once again.

This year we would also like to thank **Goacher's** brewery of Maidstone who have sponsored our Festival glasses and who have also brewed a



special festival beer, Old Perpendicular, a dark winter ale at 5.5% ABV. They are also supplying their awardwinning Gold Star (5.1%) and their 1066 Old Ale (6.7%). For more information about Goacher's please see the Winter 2001 issue of **Channel Draught**.

Newly located **Swale Brewery**, who have a long association with the Festival, have created a special brew for our Festival. Unnamed at the time of going to press, it is a light and hoppy ale at 6% ABV.

This year for the first time carrier bags (to take your glass home) will be available on request from the Glasses & Tokens stand in the Stone Hall.


We are simplifying the system used for purchasing beer, for everyone's benefit. As you may be aware, it has been impossible to use cash at the bar as there is no room for cash registers – all the available space is used for beer! We have previously used a system of tokens to cater for the differently priced beers. Our regulars often told us that this was overly complicated and unpopular. After much debate and many pints of ale, the new system has finally arrived.

All beers (with <u>one</u> exception) will be priced the same.


This year that price is £2 per pint.

Don't forget that the minimum strength is 5% alcohol by volume.

The one exception is Harvey's Imperial Extra Double Stout which appears, we believe, in draught form for the first time. This costly stout is a mammoth 9.5% ABV and we have to charge £2 for a half-pint. Please do not despair, this equates to £2 per pint of 4.7-4.8% ale. Please see the separate article about this extraordinary stout.



Now we have a fixed price (bar the exception), we have introduced plastic 'credit-card' tokens. One token will be worth £1 (or one half-pint) and can be



purchased at the Glasses & Tokens stand. Two tokens will be required per half pint of the Imperial Extra Double Stout. Those of us who haven't got our 'drinking boots' on can redeem our remaining vouchers at face value at the Glasses & Tokens stand for up to half an hour after time has been called. We must thank Dover Town Council for their kind financial support by sponsoring the tokens.

Last year we encountered problems, on the Friday evening. In persuading customers to leave the hall after the closing time at 11.30pm, even though the bar had closed at 11pm and their glasses were empty! The Town Hall staff give us an amazing amount of support and always tell us how much they enjoy our Festival.





However it causes difficulties if people do not leave promptly both for the Town Hall staff and the CAMRA staff and organisers who run the Festival. The Town Hall is locked at midnight and all clearing up has to be done in the 30 minutes from 11.30pm so that the hall is ready for opening at 10.30 the following morning. Thank you for your consideration this year.

Please remember that this Festival is run entirely by CAMRA members; some of whom are from outside our own branch (Deal Dover Sandwich & District). They are all volunteers.



Russian Stout

Harveys Extra Double Stout

As mentioned elsewhere, you will have the rare opportunity at our 2002 Festival (unless we've drunk it all!) of tasting Harvey's Extra Double Stout, This stout is not normally available in cask form.

This beer is the successor to an ale that can be traced back to about the time Harvey's brewery was founded in 1790. At this time, Imperial Russian Stout was brewed by Barclay's (of Courage, Barclay and Simmons) and the bottles proudly proclaimed "originally brewed for Catherine II Empress of all Russians".

This stout was brewed under licence in Estonia at the Le Coq brewery from where the Russian market was supplied. Barclays, and their successors, supplied the remaining market for the stout. Unfortunately, the Le Coq brewery was nationalised by Lenin in 1917 as part of the Russian Revolution

Courage continued to periodically brew this excellent beverage until they were taken over by Scottish & Newcastle Breweries in 1995.

Harvey's obtained permission from the de-nationalised Le Coq brewery to brew "Russian Stout" under licence.

Although Scottish & Newcastle no longer brew their own Russian Stout (presumably as it doesn't fit their portfolio due to the extraordinary flavour and less than or-




dinary character) they still hold the copyright to the name in the UK.

Harvey's have gone to much effort to replicate this beer and, as someone who has been a fan of Russian Stout since the late 1960s, I can bear witness to the success in matching this distinctive taste.

Obviously it is not quite the same but I am certainly looking forward to tasting a draught version for the first time.

The stout supplied to us has been maturing in a cask at Harvey's Lewes brewery for the past few



months and I am assured by Miles Jenner, the head brewer whose brainchild this was, that it will be just

ready to drink in time for our festival.

This stout is extremely complex; no less than four different malts are used in the brew (Maris Otter Pale Ale, Amber, Brown & Black) and it has won various awards.

The bottled version is available from the brewery shop in Lewes and I understand that selected Harvey's Houses have it on sale. It is reported to retail at £3 per bottle

for approximately half a pint.

Drink it at £2 per half at the White Cliffs Festival of Winter Ales – while stocks last!

Cask ale market bigger than expected

A recent report said the cask ale market was over twice the size of previous estimates.

The report in December 2001, undermines previous 'industry' reports on the size of the cask ale market and found it to be closer to 25% of the total beer market, compared with the 10% figure produced by the major brewers and pub-owning groups through their trade association.


This is likely to mean more vigorous advertising by small cask-ale producers. In turn this could knock the sales of the 'national' brands. At present, micro-brewers are producing a combined 800,000 barrels per year.

SIBA (Small Independent Brewers Assoc) said ""The microbrewers have 16 per cent of the cask ale market and yet the nationals, with far greater market access, have only 27 per cent. If smaller brewers' beers were free

to compete with the nationals in a larger proportion of the nation's pubs, it is quite probable that several national brands would collapse."

He said SIBA would be using the new data as part of its campaign to open up the marketplace.

CAMRA & Real Ale

What is Real Ale? Essentially it is beer or ale that is not pasteurised or otherwise tampered with. After brewing, living yeasts remain in the beer. When it is casked, and after the barrel is tapped & spiled ready for serving, it comes into contact with oxygen and fermentation starts again. It is this secondary fermentation that naturally carbonates the ale.

Non real ales (keg beers and lagers, nitro-keg ales, etc) use a variety of injected gasses and pressurised/constricted dispenses to try achieve the same result -in our opinion less successfully. There is also the matter of beer quality, irrespective of treatment or method of dispense, and many of us have for a long time felt that beer from the larger producers has tended towards a blander, less interesting product.

Obviously much of this is a matter of taste, and I do not think I am misrepresenting the average CAMRA member if I say that we

have no wish to see the disappearance of all other forms of ale and beer. What we do want is choice, and the reason CAMRA was formed initially was that the brewing industry, particularly the large brewers, seemed intent on depriving us of choice.



In the early Seventies, when CAMRA was formed the future for Real Ale seemed very bleak indeed. Subsequent events

have been something of a curate's egg. Initially CAMRA had considerable success and the large brewers appeared, superficially at least, to have acquired a recommitment to Real Ale, with new brews appearing and old ones being resurrected but most of them have since been ditched.

Small and regional breweries joined the bandwagon and began distributing their products far beyond their own locality, and micro brewers appeared, usually enthusiasts or ex-brewers, starting from scratch and producing beer and ale of extraordinary variety and range.

However since the Beer Orders of the late 1980s and the development of non-brewing pub chains things have altered appreciably. On the large scale the trend would seem to be the splitting of brewing and pub owning.

Carlsberg Tetley is now a brewing firm only, whilst Whitbread no longer brew or own any pubs, retaining only their restaurant chains. Scottish and Newcastle, alone of the big brewers, apparently wish to keep a foot in both camps.

Non-brewing pub chains have now emerged as some of the largest pub landlords, while the traditional brewery with its tied estate is now largely limited to the small and regional brewers; and even here there are recent examples of operations being split. An added factor is the value attached to some older breweries who occupy valuable town centre or city sites.

If you feel concerned, and are not

already a member, consider joining CAMRA, it costs only £16 a year (single membership) and as well as receiving our monthly newspaper "What's Brewing", and advantages like free or reduced entry to CAMRA beer festivals, you will belong to one of the country's foremost pressure groups and be contributing to preserving an important and very traditional part of British life.

<u>A Whistle Stop</u> <u>Guide to Dover Town</u> <u>Pubs</u>

Those of you who are planning an extended stay might want to try out a selection of our town pubs and we include a handy map (page 21) to help you find them. The good news is not only are there plenty to choose from but almost all of those in (or close to) the main shopping streets are open all day and many offer at least one Real Ale, overall choice having improved markedly in recent years. Note that only those which sell Real Ale all of the time are listed.

Start at the Town Hall for two very different pubs offering up to six ales apiece. The **Prince Albert** (no. 17 on the map) is a lively drinkers' bar with a selection including Adnams Bitter and Fuller's London Pride amongst former Whitbread brews. The "EKB" is not as local as it appears, being from Tolly Cobbold in East Anglia, but Stonehouse is a genuine fizz-free cider.

Just around the corner in Ladywell, the **Park Inn** (16) has been renovated as a neo-Victorian style bar/diner (plus B&B). Here the beers include Wells Bombardier, Greene King Old Speckled Hen and Courage Directors plus a guest ale...

A short detour left into Dour Street then across the Co-Op/B & Q car park into the Louis Armstrong (13). The music connection continues (Sunday night is Jazz night) along with Draught Bass. A guest ale from any one of several micro-breweries including Cottage or Burton Bridge, is available most days, and always at weekends.

Visible from here (past the lights) is the **Red Lion** (18) which has Flowers OB and Boddies - new tenants hare here (may now be open during the afternoon having previously closed then)

The imposing Eagle remains firmly closed (work is under way) but further up London Road there is more EKB at the Sportsman and Greene King IPA at the Cherry Tree whilst Shep's Old Endeavour (GBG*) often has a seasonal ale alongside Master Brew. Finally, at Buckland Bridge, the low-beamed Bull has Flowers IPA (may close afternoons).

no-smoking lounge whilst the main bar has wooden flooring and a range fire. The lone handpump is occasionally still used but the real joy for the ale drinker is behind the bar where the high-tech gravity-dispense system keeps the beers at the right angle and temperature.

No big brand names here but mainly micro-brews plus a few regionals between them arriving from all over the country. The dispense can take up to six firkins but to ensure tiptop condition expect to see two or three at time, usually in contrasting styles or strengths. When one is finished then it's time for the next ones to go on. For cider drinkers there is usually something from Thatcher's.

Across York Street dual-carriageway into Bench Street (mind the big hole). No joy at a couple of Cafe-type bars but definitely some in the Flotilla & Firkin (GBG*) (9) which also has a family certificate valid until 6 O'Clock.

Another area worth looking at is to head up Folkestone Road towards Elms Vale although being suburban some pubs do close in the afternoon. Pubmaster's **Engineer** (7) has Adnams Southwold and is the nearest real ale to Dover Priory station.

The steep hill alongside takes you up to the Malvern (14) for Shep's Master Brew. Up the main road and turn into Elms Vale (signposted to Tower Hamlets) - more Shep's in the Crown & Sceptre (5) often including the stronger brews Spitfire or Bishop's Finger. Cross over into Eaton Rd where the The Boar's Head (3) has two handpumps - sometimes the beers come through Whitbread or Greene King but genuine guests make frequent appearances.

Finally carry on uphill into Tower Hamlets and second left (Goschen


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
