1) TSB, Castle Street: On this spot in September 1944 fell the last enemy shell, fired from France, to land in Kent. (The Dover Society).

2) Market Square: Near this spot were the town's "instruments of punishment" including stocks, pillory and whipping post (The Dover Society).

3) Camden Crescent: Here, at Number Ten, Charles Dickens and his family lodged in 1852 while he wrote parts of Bleak House. Wilkie Collins was a regular visitor. (The Dover Society).

4) Southern House: It was here, when this was the Lord Warden Hotel,' that Napoleon III was re-united with his wife Eugenie after he abdicated in 1871 and came into exile in England (The Dover Society).

5) Charlton Centre (need checking exact spot): Here was the home of Dover man William H. Elgar (1 822-1906), the father of composer SirWilliam Elgar who was born in Worcester in 1857. (The Dover Society).

6) Maritime Hall, Snargate Street: Here was born Philip Yorke (1690) later Baron Hardwicke, who became Lord Chancellor in 1737. Instituted Calling of Banns before weddings (Marriage Act 1753). (The Dover Society).

7) **NOW DELETED** Malvern House,' London Road, River (house yet to be located): Here P.G. Wodehouse received some of his education when this house was a school. (More information from Jack Woolford) (The Dover Society).

8) High Street (bottom of Tower Hamlets Road): Near this spot was Dover's place of execution, by hanging, until 1823. (The Dover Society)

9) Underpass, Bench Street: Beneath this spot in September 1992 was discovered a Bronze Age boat reputed to be 3,000 years old. (The Dover Society).

10) Taswell Street-Taswell Close area (once a garden): Near this spot, on Christmas Eve 1914, fell the first aerial bomb ever to be dropped on the United Kingdom. (The Dover Society).

11) On the museum, site of the Market Hall. Here the bodies of those who gave their lives in the Zeebrugge Raid in 1918, temporarily rested.
